# bjechives

- Child will be able to analyze three of Mozart's pieces

#### Introduce

 Listen to these pieces of music by Mozart (at least for one minute) and complete the Listening Sheet associated with each piece (Lesson Sheet I).

## Mozart the composer

## discussion read aloud

In our last lesson we talked about Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. How many pieces of music did he compose? (allow time for response) 600! That is a lot of pieces of music!

Some of these pieces had words for people to sing. Mozart composed many **operas**. An opera is much like a play except that it is all set to music and instead of the people talking they sing. We will learn about some of his operas in future lessons.

A lot of his work was also **instrumental**. Do you know what that means? It means that he wrote music only for instruments. He composed (or wrote down) what each instrument should play. When all the instruments played their part his song would come to life as he intended.

When a **composer** writes a song he uses musical notes. Have you ever seen those before? (show Read Aloud Card I) It's like a secret language for music! We will learn about these notes in a later lesson as well.

Mozart's music is still played and enjoyed by people today. Often, music that was written a long time ago but still enjoyed today is called **classical** music. This means that Mozart is a classical music composer.

We still have musical composers today. Today, there are many different types of music. Each type of music usually has it's own set of instruments. But, no matter the type of music, someone must compose a song to be played!

And you get to be a composer today! Are you ready?


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# IMPORTANT: For this activity, you will need some sort of toy xylophone.


FIRST: Print pages 8-15 OR create your own color rectangles with construction paper (be aware: xylophones keys are different colors)




**NEXT:** Print four copies of page 7 and lie them on the ground in a row front of the xylophone.










NOW: Play your composition!











