
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Adjectives are words that tell what something looks like, smells like, tastes like, feels like, or sounds like. They are **describing words**.

Look at the word sort below and circle all of the words that could describe something.





Describe It: How, When and Where

An **adverb** is a word that describes **verbs** or **adjectives**. Adverbs usually describe how, when or where something happens.

For example:

Judy talks <u>loudly</u>. (how) Susie <u>always</u> takes the bus. (when) Roy looked <u>up</u>. (where)
